The Adoption Medicine Clinic (AMC) is excited to host the second annual AMC Symposium: Helping Children Thrive which takes a multidisciplinary approach to assessing and caring for children who have been adopted internationally, domestically, or are in foster/kinship care. This is a 1-day educational conference for social workers, physicians, psychologists, behavioral therapists, occupational therapists and families to learn about AMC research, practices and advocacy. Through focused and collaborative sessions, attendees will learn about the power of the AMC's interdisciplinary team approach through a series of lectures, case studies and discussions. This year's conference will have a primary focus on school age children.

Objectives:

- Discuss the need for comprehensive assessments of a child with a history of foster/kinship care or adoption
- Describe the components of the Comprehensive Child Wellness Assessment (CCWA)
- Identify common issues associated with prenatal drug and alcohol exposure
- Describe the role of a Developmental Behavioral Pediatrician in consultation and how they support children, families and other professionals who work with children who are adopted or in foster care
- Identify the components of the psychology screening for school age children at the AMC
